

40th Anniversary of Liberation

On the 1st July 1940 the Island of Jersey was occupied by German troops, after a brief bombing raid a few days earlier, and became with the other Channel Islands the only British soil to be controlled by Germany during World War II. The occupation lasted for nearly five years during which time extensive fortifications were constructed by the Germans and the population suffered deprivations and deportations.

The invasion of Normandy by the Allies in 1944 bypassed the Channel Islands leaving them isolated under German rule, but without sources of supply for the inhabitants or the garrison. The last year was one of near starvation for all concerned. Much has been written and televised concerning these years in the Island's history which were to end on 9th May 1945 when a British force liberated the Island and the German commander signed the terms of surrender on board HMS Beagle, anchored off Jersey.

Winston Churchill announced the forthcoming liberation in the British House of Commons in the following words "Our dear Channel Islands will also be freed today".

To mark this important occasion, two coins, both bearing a new crowned effigy of H.M. The Queen, are to be struck. The first is a fifty pence coin for general circulation to replace the current fifty pence for 1985 only. This has on its reverse a Union Jack crossed with the Jersey flag, as in use in 1945, with a symbolic broken chain underneath. The fifty pence will be struck in cupro nickel to the same specification as the current fifty pence coin.







The second commemorative coin is 'crown' size and legal tender for £2. The obverse has the new crowned effigy of H.M. The Queen and on the reverse is depicted the destroyer HMS Beagle. An incuse security edge bears Winston Churchill's words. Circulation coins will be struck in cupro nickel of which a number will be specially processed 'uncirculated' to be presented in special cases to the Island's school children. These will also be available in presentation packs for collectors at £3.75 each.

I confirm that I spoke to Mr Coombe some time ago about fixing Liberation stamps to our PNC covers, and he agreed to consider whether the Guernsey Philatellic Bureau could undertake this work, against the free supply of covers for local sale in guernsey. Despatch costs for sending covers to Guernsey will be for the Royal Mint account though hopefully Guernsey will meet the return cost.

I suggest that your proceed with the arrangements to send the covers to Guernsey, who have stipulated that the covers must be stamped in Guernsey. I suggest that arrangements are finalised direct with Mr Coombe.







CHANNEL ISLANDS INCENTIVE COIN PROMOTION

Further to your memo dated 25 February, I regret that neither Guernsey or Jersey are willing to authorise special arrangements for their £2 Liberation coins to be used in this incentive promotion.

Jersey takes the very traditional line about maintaining the dignity of its coinage, and under no circumstances will it co-operate in an incentive promotion. Guernsey initially were sympathetic. However, they have now decided that the promotion could possibly compete with their own numismatic issues, and they have therefore decided against co-operating. The promoter could of course try to obtain coins at face value on each Island through the banking system, if he so wished.

REPORT OF A VISIT TO THE STATES OF JERSEY TREASURY, ST HELIER ON TUESDAY 5 MARCH, 1985.

Background

The visit was arranged at Jersey's request, to discuss marketing arrangements for commemorative coins.

Liberation Issue Coins

50 pence and £2 coins are being issued commemorating the 40th Anniversary of liberation. Jersey is selling the coins by a subscription list, which opened on 1st March and which closes on 12th April. Coins will be issued commencing on 9th May, which is the date of the anniversary.

It was agreed that details of the coins may be circulated immediately to Royal Mint agents, and that they should also be included in the May/June editions of the "Bulletin" and "Chronicle". Promotion of other Jersey coins should be held over for mailing at a later date, in order to maximise interest.

Jersey will supply presentation cases for gold and silver proof coins sold by the Royal Mint, in accordance with normal practice. The suppliers have been asked to send sample cases direct to the Royal Mint. Silver proof coins will be packed in a brown case with a brown coin block.

The marketing package originally agreed by Jersey included a £2 cupro-nickel uncirculated coin in a blister pack. The States Treasurer admitted that approval for the Royal Mint to market the coin, in return for a royalty of 50 pence on each coin sold, contravened the requirement that a minimum of full face value must be received for all legal tender coins. Following a discussion on the market for uncirculated coins, and marketing strategies, it was agreed that this product would not be sold by the Royal Mint. The Treasurer acknowledged that any blame attached solely to the States

Treasury, and he confirmed that Jersey will reimburse any abortive costs incurred by the Royal Mint resulting from the changed decision. A quotation will be submitted for a reduced quantity of 4,300 blister packs, to enable a decision to be made as to whether or not this form of packing will be used for uncirculated coins ordered by Jersey.

Jersey is concerned to maintain the integrity of its coinage, and it will not participate in any promotion which might detract from the dignity of the coinage. For this reason, it will not give authority for its coins to be used in connection with the Imperial Tobacco incentive promotion.

£1 Parish Series Coins

The next coin in the series will be the St Clement design. Jersey's subscription list will open on 30 May and close on 12 July, and coins will be issued from 1st August. The Royal Mint may circulate details of the St Clement coin to agents from 30 May, on the understanding that retail orders are not fulfilled before 1st August. The coins should be promoted in the July/August editions of the "Bulletin" and "Chronicle".

Subject to final agreement, the St Lawrence issue will be marketed in the Autumn. Jersey's subscription list will be open for the period 6 September to 18 October, and the issue date will be 4th November.

Royal Mint marketing arrangements will be similar to those for the 1984 issues. Packaging is to be ordered from Jersey. There will be changes in packaging for 1985 issues, and sample cases will be delivered to us from the supplier. Silver proof coins will be in Wilmott type presentation cases covered in green and with a black coin block.

Other Commemorative Issues

Jersey will probably participate in the coin programme for the 25th Anniversary of the World Wildlife Fund. Commemorative issues will be limited to 1 per year, in addition to issues for the Parish series. Jersey will also participate in the Commonwealth Games Programme, providing a suitable slot for issuing the coin can be agreed.





JERSEY LIBERATION COIN PROGRAMME

Further to our recent discussions on the Jersey Liberation coins, my comments are as follows:

- In view of Jersey's insistence that the price for the gold coin is £1,000 excluding VAT (£1,150 including VAT), I would not propose to market these either to UK retail or trade markets. I feel that Jersey are taking advantage of the extremely small issue limit and the Royal Mint, in the eyes of its own customers, will be seen to be making an exhorbitant profit by artificially maintaining a low issue limit. I do not regard it as an acceptable excuse to blame the country authority for setting the issue limit as the damage will have been done as far as our own customers are concerned.
- The quantities required for Marketing for other than gold products, which will need to be issued as an Amendment to Works Order No 270, will be 1,000 silver proof and 5,000 £2 Uncirculated coins, to be placed in blister packs. I note that Amendment No 2 indicates a production requirement of 15,000 £2 uncirculated coins, but the analysis in the Additional Information, Item 4, states 10,000 of these are required in capsules and 4,500 in blister packs. Is there a further requirement for the other 500?

As regards pricing of the Jersey £2 blister pack, you will wish to note that we have offered the Guernsey coin to the UK retail list at the <u>agreed</u> price of £3.45 (£3.00, excluding VAT). We had not been informed by Guernsey direct or by Sales that the price, which had been agreed by Martin Jones on 6 October, 1984, at £3.45, including VAT, had been increased. In view of this, would you please indicate whether you or the Jersey Authorities wish the Jersey £2 uncirculated blister to be sold at their preferred price of £3.95, including VAT, or at a lower price, closer to the Guernsey price.

JERSEY LIBERATION COMMEMORATIVES

I have discussed the Pricing Assessments with Peter Green and he has advised that Jersey are content with the prices and discounts we have recommended for the silver proof crown, but that currently they would prefer the price for the gold piece to remain at £995, including VAT, £865 excluding VAT. Due to the low issue limits, they believe that these prices can be achieved. They also prefer to hold the high discount, which equates to the discounts they have previously offered to Jersey dealers. I said to Peter Green that in view of the low quantities we will hold to our normal gold discounts of 5% and I see no real problems developing in this area.

With reference to the blister pack, Jersey wish to review the prices that have suggested and are looking to see whether they can bring them in line with the Guernsey prices. Peter Green has requested a Cost Estimate to be supplied to him in order that he can assess whether it will be possible for the manufacturing cost to be kept sufficiently low to enable Jersey and Guernsey prices to be compatible.

Marketing Promotions have been requested by Jersey to suggest designs for the cupro-nickel blister pack and Jersey have offered to help with any material which is considered necessary.

Jersey also wish to supply the cases for the silver coin (which they have indicated will cost us 45 pence each), and for the gold coin, (which they have indicated will cost £3.50 each). I have asked Peter Green if Jersey can provide samples of these cases as it will assist with our promotion material.

JERSEY LIBERATION COIN PROGRAMME

Thank you for yourmemo dated 13 February about the pricing of these issues.

As discussed, I have passed on your proposals to the customer, who will take them into account in fixing prices at which the coins are to be sold in Jersey. However, I doubt whether they will reduce the price of the gold proof, which they believe will easily sell out on rarity value alone. The higher discount for the gold proof is in line with that offered to local dealers in Jersey for previous issues. In this instance, I imagine that the bulk of the small quantity of coins available will be taken up by retail orders, so that the dealers discount is unlikely to be a major problem.

I confirm that Jersey wish us to use their packaging for the gold and silver proofs. They intend to use the Willmott type case for the silver coin, priced at approximately 45 pence, and a walnut box for the gold proof, priced at about £3.50. When you confirm the quantities of coins required for Royal Mint marketing, could you also please confirm that I should order similar quantities of presentation cases.

Jersey confirm that they wish us to design the blister pack for the uncirculated crown, and I would be grateful if this could be put in hand as quickly as possible. Jersey offer all possible help, if you are in need of reference material.

I will pass on any further comments about pricing levels as soon as possible.

JERSEY LIBERATION COIN PROGRAMME

Further to your memo of 8 February, would you please find attached Assessments of Proposed Selling Prices for the Jersey Liberation coins. I understand that you have had discussions with John Parker concerning the prices suggested by Jersey, and where these differ, I will indicate below:

1. JERSEY LIBERATION £2 SILVER

£25 excluding VAT, (£28.75 including VAT)

Recommended discounts on silver coins are :

5 - 19 : 15% (exc VAT selling price £21.25) 20 and over : 22% (exc VAT selling price £19.50)

Compared to the suggested Jersey discounts, this allows a discount level of 5 - 19, and does not introduce the Jersey discount price until a quantity of 20 or more are purchased.

- 2. JERSEY LIBERATION £2 GOLD
 - Recommended selling price, £778.26 excluding VAT (£895.00 including VAT).

This is substantially lower than the Jersey recommended price of £865.00, (£995.00 including VAT). This high price was used for the crown size pieces sold for the Falkland 150th Anniversary and St Helena 150th Anniversary coins, but the recent Kiribati crown size coin was reduced to a more realistic level of £726.09 excluding VAT (£835.00 including VAT). The price that we now recommend takes into account this more realistic pricing level, and also the extremely low issue limit. As far as discount is concerned, I would recommend a dealer discount level of 5% rather than 13.3%, as recommended by Jersey. This then keeps the gold discount in line with the normal discount system we allow for gold coins.

- 3. * The recommended price for the £2 UNCIRCULATED BLISTER PACK is £3.43, excluding VAT (£3.95 including VAT). I think the price recommended by Jersey of £3.75 excluding VAT (£4.31 including VAT) is far too high for a £2 uncirculated coin. You may recall that the price of the £2 Guernsey unc is substantially less than this, at £3, excluding VAT and £3.45 including VAT.
- 4. As regards the 50 PENCE CUPRO NICKEL ORDINARY, you say that we propose selling the coin at face value and paying to Jersey the difference between face value and cost of manufacture. As far as overseas agents are concerned, there will, of course, be an element of freight to be incurred and to get maximum benefit in terms of sales quantity, could you please advise whether Jersey would accept the freight charges as part of the 'Cost of Manufacture'. Jersey would still be receiving the benefit of the seignorage through sales at face value.

JERSEY LIBERATION COIN PROGRAMME

Further to your memo of 8 February, would you please find attached Assessments of Proposed Selling Prices for the Jersey Liberation coins. I understand that you have had discussions with John Parker concerning the prices suggested by Jersey, and where these differ, I will indicate below:

1. JERSEY LIBERATION £2 SILVER

£25 excluding VAT, (£28.75 including VAT)

Recommended discounts on silver coins are :

5 - 19 : 15% (exc VAT selling price £21.25) 20 and over : 22% (exc VAT selling price £19.50)

Compared to the suggested Jersey discounts, this allows a discount level of 5 - 19, and does not introduce the Jersey discount price until a quantity of 20 or more are purchased.

2. JERSEY LIBERATION £2 GOLD

Recommended selling price, £778.26 excluding VAT (£895.00 including VAT).

This is substantially lower than the Jersey recommended price of £865.00, (£995.00 including VAT). This high price was used for the crown size pieces sold for the Falkland 150th Anniversary and St Helena 150th Anniversary coins, but the recent Kiribati crown size coin was reduced to a more realistic level of £726.09 excluding VAT (£835.00 including VAT). The price that we now recommend takes into account this more realistic pricing level, and also the extremely low issue limit. As far as discount is concerned, I would recommend a dealer discount level of 5% rather than 13.3%, as recommended by Jersey. This then keeps the gold discount in line with the normal discount system we allow for gold coins.

- 3. The recommended price for the £2 UNCIRCULATED BLISTER PACK is £3.43, excluding VAT (£3.95 including VAT). I think the price recommended by Jersey of £3.75 excluding VAT (£4.31 including VAT) is far too high for a £2 uncirculated coin. You may recall that the price of the £2 Guernsey unc is substantially less than this, at £3 excluding VAT and £3.45 including VAT.
- 4. As regards the 50 PENCE CUPRO NICKEL ORDINARY, you say that we propose selling the coin at face value and paying to Jersey the difference between face value and cost of manufacture. As far as overseas agents are concerned, there will, of course, be an element of freight to be incurred and to get maximum benefit in terms of sales quantity, could you please advise whether Jersey would accept the freight charges as part of the 'Cost of Manufacture'. Jersey would still be receiving the benefit of the seignorage through sales at face value.

Thank you for your letter dated 1 February about current coinage matters.

Liberation Issue

I am sorry for the errors which crept into our telemessage of 29 January. Unfortunately, we could not contact you by telex at the time, and the telemessage was used as an alternative. As explained to Mr Monins, we are proposing a royalty of £4 on the silver proof £2 coins, and we estimate that we could sell up to 15,000 50 pence ordinary coins to dealers at face value.

We trust that the proposals in this message are favourably received. Your early decision on the method of marketing would be appreciated, as our marketing branch cannot plan their campaign pending your confirmation that you wish us to market the issue on your behalf.

We note that you require 50,000 pieces of the 50 pence coin, which we are planning to have available for despatch by the end of March. I confirm that the reverse design is being modified, as disdussed between Mr Monins and Mr Elsasser. It was agreed that we would send you an impression of the master tools, to show the modification made to the flags, and I will be sending this on to you in the next few days.

Parish Series £1 Coins

I confirm that we are proceeding with toolwork for the St Clement and St Lawrence designs. These will retain the existing Machin effigy, with the date 1985. We will be sending you pre-production samples for approval shortly. We hope to have the circulation St Clement's coins available by end March, and have planned to do the St Lawrence design in August.



I understand that you intend to market the 1985 issues in the same way as was agreed for the St Saviour and St Brelade's issues. Your confirmation on this point would be appreciated, in order that we may proceed with production arrangements for coins for Royal Mint marketing, and also to arrange a suitable marketing spot. In this connection, we had explained to Mr Harris last year, that it takes 6 to 8 weeks to obtain precious metal blanks for striking gold and silver coins, and we therefore need to order blanks now, if you wish us to be striking St Clement coins during April. The Royal Mint usually borrows bullion for conversion to blanks. This facility is available to you, and you therefore have the option either of buying silver now to fix the bullion element of coins, or of borrowing the bullion initially, in which case, you would pay the bullion price ruling nearer the time the coins go on sale plus a small charge for financing.

If we work on the 1984 marketing arrangements, the Royal Mint would like to proceed with the manufacture of 800 silver proof St Clement coins. We would also wish to have an initial allocation of 25 gold proof St Clement coins. We would prefer to purchase our own bullion for gold coins which we market, though we will be happy to consider buying back surplus St Helier coins, if you so wish.

I understand that you are considering changing the packaging for the 1985 issues, and your early decision in this matter would be appreciated. We take it that you would wish to sell us packaging for coins which we sell, and we can confirm our order directly details of the packaging are known. However, at the present time, we do have a stock of the 1984 packaging available, and we wonder whether there would be any objection to using this for part of the St Clement issue.

Circulation Coins

We thank you for your order for coins from 1 pence to 10 pence inclusive. We are assuming that these coins will bear the existing designs, with the Machin effigy and date 1985, and I will let you have our quotation on this basis in the next few days.

This letter is intended to bring us fully up to date, but please let me know if anything has been omitted.



I AM EXTREMELY SORRY TO HAVE KEPT YOU WAITING SO LONG FOR OUR PROPOSALS. UNFORTUNATELY WE HAVE BEEN PLAGUED BY SICKNESS, AND I HAVE ONLY JUST RETURNED TO THE OFFICE.

MR D M JONES WAR LOUNS IN NORTH AMERICA

As you know, we are very pleased to have the opportunity of marketing Guernsey and Jersey coins in North America, but only on the basis that we have sole marketing rights. On two occasions, recently, there have been press releases in the North American Numismatic papers. One gave the address of the Jersey dealer who had notified World Coin News of the issue, and gave his name and address for those who wished to order, and in the more recent case, the Guernsey local industries coins appeared in the Canadian Coin News with the UK Bureau's address. This latter release was probably inspired by Guernsey.

This publicity causes us problems because it appears before we have had the opportunity to bring the availability of the coins to our own customers (in the case of Guernsey, I had not even seen the photograph of the coins). Even worse, the trade papers rarely give a second bite of the cherry, which means that the North American Bureau address will not appear in the publicity. In the case of the Jersey coins, we could lose customers to the Jersey dealer and, in both cases, customers could be put off by the fact that they would have to send money outside the country and, consequently, would not order from any foreign supplier.

I appreciate the fact that it may be difficult to persuade Jersey and Guernsey to confine their press releases to Europe and also to stop their dealers from notifying numismatic papers outside the islands (and certainly in North America) of the availability of the coins. However, I would be grateful if you could emphasise the fact that they could be losing orders, but allowing the present situation to continue.

- 2. With reference to the silver proof crown, I would consider the Royal Mint requirement to be approximately 1500, but would not, as suggested in my earlier memo, consider promoting them in a 2-coin case. It is likely that the Guernsey crown will be offered in the February Bulletin, but the Jersey crown will not be available for offer until the May Bulletin. With reference to the gold crown-size piece, I suggested to Martin Jones that if the issue limit was increased to approximately 100, the Royal Mint would consider marketing an initial quantity of 50 pieces.

As regards the 50p, I can only see this being offered at face value direct to dealers and agents.

Perhaps you could clarify whether Jersey wish the Royal Mint to promote to its retail list and to our network of agents and dealers, or whether Jersey are intending to do the overseas marketing themselves.

Further to your memo of 22 October, my comments are as follows:

You mention the issue of 20,000 cupro-nickel BU crowns, face value £2, but you do not say whether you expect these to be issued loose or in blister packs. I would propose to link this Liberation crown with Guernsey and would suggest the production of a combined blister pack and consider that sales of possibly 2,500 might be attainable. In addition to this, cupro-nickel BUs should be provided loose for the dealer and agent requirements. It would be essential, in this instance, that we were not charged by Jersey the full £2 face value, but that we paid them a royalty which allowed ourselves some profit within the overall seignorage.

I would consider the Royal Mint requirement for the silver proof crown to be approximately 1,500 and again I would consider marketing this in a 2-crown case which would include the Guernsey and Jersey silver proof coins. I do not think this issue would be large enough to warrant its own brochure and would therefore promote in the May Bulletin.

With reference to the gold crown-size coins, it would be preferable if the issue limit was raised to 100 to allow the Royal Mint to have quantities to offer to its mailing list and overseas agents and dealers. If the issue limit is increased to 100 the Royal Mint marketing quantity would initially be approximately 50.

I would not be prepared to undertake a second bite of the cherry if Jersey were not successful with their initial marketing of their own products. We have done this before and it is not looked upon favourably with our agents and dealers.

As far as the 50p is concerned, I do not see there is any possibility of marketing this unless it is included in an uncirculated set.

You comments on the foregoing would be appreciated.

JERSEY LIBERATION ANNIVERSARY COINS

Further to your memo of 22 October, my comments are as follows :

You mention the issue of 20,000 cupro-nickel BU crowns, face value £2, but you do not say whether you expect these to be issued loose or in blister packs. I would propose to link this Liberation crown with Guernsey and would suggest the production of a combined blister pack and consider that sales of possibly 2,500 might be attainable. In addition to this, cupro-nickel BUs should be provided loose for the dealer and agent requirements. It would be essential, in this instance, that we were not charged by Jersey the full £2 face value, but that we paid them a royalty which allowed ourselves some profit within the overall seignorage.

I would consider the Royal Mint requirement for the silver proof crown to be approximately 1,500 and again I would consider marketing this in a 2-crown case which would include the Guernsey and Jersey silver proof coins. I do not think this issue would be large enough to warrant its own brochure and would therefore promote in the May Bulletin.

With reference to the gold crown-size coins, it would be preferable if the issue limit was raised to 100 to allow the Royal Mint to have quantities to offer to its mailing list and overseas agents and dealers. If the issue limit is increased to 100 the Royal Mint marketing quantity would initially be approximately 50.

I would not be prepared to undertake a second bite of the cherry if Jersey were not successful with their initial marketing of their own products. We have done this before and it is not looked upon favourably with our agents and dealers.

As far as the 50p is concerned, I do not see there is any possibility of marketing this unless it is included in an uncirculated set.

You comments on the foregoing would be appreciated.

Germans via the British Legation in Berne and, while the Germans' official reply was awaited, their unofficial action was revealed they immediately confiscated all the civilian food stocks and reduced the ration to a bare minimum Churchill was furious when he heard the news but was on the horns of a dilemma as the report had come from a top secret Ultra decoded message. An inviolate principle of Ultra was that no intelligence so received could be used if the resultant action

might lead the Germans to believe that their signals were being compromised Thus Churchill could not reveal that he knew of the confiscation order and had to wait instead, in frustration, for the official German reply

As early as July, Bailiff Carey on Guernsey had tried to send a letter to the International Red Cross to point out the mounting dif-ficulties the Islanders were facing. By October, when no reply had been received, he assumed (quite correctly) that the Germans had not passed on the letter and the Bailiff then decided the only alternative was to try to send someone to England with a message although he was well aware of the risks. However, before he could act, a group of civilians took matters into their own hands and one of their number, a retired Merchant Navy captain, Fred Noyon, left Guernsey with a friend, ostensibly on a fishing trip, on the night of November 3. The men were picked up by an American ship and they reached London on November 12 By that time, the British Government, through Ultra, was already aware of the situation and, as we have seen, had already taken the decision to send in tood parcels but when these arrived it was naturally assumed that Fred Noyon had been responsible for saving the island. (The BBC had broadcast a coded message on a Forces' programme on December 9 to inform the group in Guernsey of Noyon's safe arrival.)


On Wednesday, December 27 a Red Cross Ship, the Vega, reached Guernsey. On board were over 100,000 tood parcels — more than enough for every civilian on the Islands together with toilet and medical supplies and cigarettes. The Bailiff of Jersey made his first visit to Guernsey the following day so that he and Bailiff Carey could make plans for its distribution. To give him his due, the German B d B.K., Oberst Graf von Schmettow, issued strict instructions to the troops that everything must go to the civilians — a ruling which was strictly enforced even as far as forbidding the acceptance of gifts by his men. On December 29 the Vegu sailed for Jersey to unload that island's share.

One regrettable result of the delivery was an immediate increase in the crime rate with the theit of food from civilians who were now better off than the Germans. On the pretext of preventing hoarding, the Germans instituted raids on private houses and one direct result of these searches was that much foodstuff was 'confiscated'. At the same time there were some remarkable discoveries and one man was tound to be sitting on a cache of 363 tins of provisions and 365 bottles of spirits!


The Red Cross ship, the SS Vega, which performed the 20th century role of Florence Nightingale during the desperate last months of the war (R. H. Mayne).

The Vega returned in February and thereafter made monthly trips until the surrender. During her six voyages from neutral Portugal she had brought nearly 460,000 food parcels, many sent from Canada and New Zealand, and, by way of a token of their appreciation to the International Red Cross, the Islanders collected £170,000 for the organisation after the liberation.

In February, command of the Islands was transferred to Vizeadmiral Friedrich Huffmeier and it was to him that the Allies



In November 1944 the Bailiff of Jersey, A. M. (now Lord) Coutanche, drafted a message to the Platzkommandant for transmission to the Allies:


Sufficient anaesthetics until middle of January but only for urgent operations. Many most essential drugs now exhausted, butter stocks will be exhausted end of December, no margarine, soap exhausted except for hospitals, no gas since September, electricity will fail middle of January, no matches. Supplies of footwear and textiles practically exhausted. General state of public health causing increasing anxiety to Insular Government Favour of a reply requested.

Eventually agreement was reached between the British and German Governments to allow a Red Cross ship to leave Lisbon on 7 December 1944 with 750 tons of food parcels, and at 6 p.m. on 30 December a Swedish vessel named Vega, on charter to the International Red Cross, docked at St Helier with the long-awaited food parcels. This occasion caused indescribable joy and relief on the part of the civilian population who had probably-just spent the most miserable Christmas in the island's history. The first issue was made on 4 January 1945, four months before liberation.

Germans via the British Legation in Berne and, while the Germans' official reply was awaited, their unofficial action was revealed: they immediately confiscated all the civilian tood stocks and reduced the ration to a bare minimum. Churchill was furious when he heard the news but was on the horns of a dilemma as the report had come from a top secret. Ultra decoded message. An inviolate principle of Ultra was that no intelligence so received could be used if the resultant action might lead the Germans to believe that their signals were being compromised. Thus Churchill could not reveal that he knew of the confiscation order and had to wait instead, in trustration, for the official German reply.

As early as July, Bailiff Carey on Guernsey had tried to send a letter to the International Red Cross to point out the mounting dif-ficulties the islanders were facing. By October, when no reply had been received, he assumed (quite correctly) that the Germans had not passed on the letter and the Bailiff then decided the only alternative was to try to send someone to England with a message although he was well aware of the risks. However, before he could act, a group of civilians took matters into their own hands and one of their number, a retired Merchant Navy captain, Fred Noyon, left Guernsey with a friend, ostensibly on a fishing trip, on the night of November 3. The men were picked up by an American ship and they reached London on November 12. By that time, the British Government, through Ultra, was already aware of the situation and, as we have seen, had already taken the decision to send in tood parcels but when these arrived it was naturally assumed that Fred Noyon had been responsible for saving the Island (The BBC had broadcast a coded message on a Forces' programme on December 9 to inform the group in Guernsey of Noyon's safe arrival.)

On Wednesday, December 27 a Red Cross Ship, the Vega, reached Guernsey On board were over 100,000 food parcels — more than enough for every civilian on the Islands — together with toilet and medical supplies and cigarettes. The Bailiff of Jersey made his first visit to Guernsey the following day so that he and Bailiff Carey could make plans for its distribution. To give him his due, the German B d B.K., Oberst Graf von Schmettow, issued strict instructions to the troops that everything must go to the civilians — a ruling which was strictly enforced even as far as forbidding the acceptance of gifts by his men. On December 29 the Vega sailed for Jersey to unload that

island's share

One regrettable result of the delivery was an immediate increase in the crime rate with the theft of food from civilians who were now better off than the Germans. On the pretext of preventing hoarding, the Germans instituted raids on private houses and one direct result of these searches was that much foodstuff was 'confiscated'. At the same time there were some remarkable discoveries and one man was found to be sitting on a cache of 363 lins of provisions and 365 buttles of spirits!

The Red Cross ship, the SS Vega, which performed the 20th century role of Florence Nightingale during the desperate last months of the war (R. H. Mayne).


The Vega returned in February and thereafter made monthly trips until the surrender During her six voyages from neutral Portugal she had brought nearly 460,000 food parcels, many sent from Canada and New Zealand, and, by way of a token of

their appreciation to the International Red Cross, the Islanders collected £170,000 for the organisation after the liberation

In February, command of the Islands was transferred to Vizeadmiral Friedrich Huftmeier and it was to him that the Allies



In November 1944 the Bailiff of Jersey, A. M. (now Lord) Coutanche, drafted a message to the Platzkommandant for transmission to the Allies:


Sufficient anaesthetics until middle of January but only for urgent operations. Many most essential drugs now exhausted, butter stocks will be exhausted end of December, no margarine, soap exhausted except for hospitals, no gas since September, electricity will fail middle of January, no matches. Supplies of footwear and textiles practically exhausted. General state of public health causing increasing anxiety to Insular Government Favour of a reply requested.

Eventually agreement was reached between the British and German Governments to allow a Red Cross ship to leave Lisbon on 7 December 1944 with 750 tons of food parcels, and at 6 p.m. on 30 December a Swedish vessel named Vega, on charter to the International Red Cross, docked at St Helier with the long-awaited food parcels. This occasion caused indescribable joy and relief on the part of the civilian population who had probably-just spent the most miserable Christmas in the island's history. The first issue was made on 4 January 1945, four months before liberation.

JERSEY COINAGE - ANNIVERSARY OF LIBERATION

The States of Jersey Treasury have decided to issue 2 coins commerating the 40th Anniversary of Liberation.

The first coin will be a crown size piece and as you know from previous correspondence, will have the new effigy (design B) on the obverse. For the sake of uniformity, the inscription should read "Queen Elizabeth Second" but should not bear the date.

As far as the reverse is concerned, this has not yet been designed and I would like you to produce sketches as soon as possible. Some briefing material from the States Treasury is enclosed for your information but in addition to the enclosed, the design should also bear the inscription "Bailiwick of Jersey" and the denomination "F2". Two PoundS.

Although all the other coins are obverse dated, I would suggest that you try and incorporate the date or two dates, ie. 1945 - 1985 onto the reverse design. If we can possibly leave the date off the obverse, it will serve Jersey the cost of redating future crown size pieces.

The second coin to be produced will be a standard 50 pence piece and this also will bear the revised effigy but to be uniform with the rest of the circulating issues should have the date "1985" on the obverse.

Again, the reverse for this coin needs to be designed according to the briefing material shows and t he inscription "Bailiwick of Jersey" should also appear as it does on other circulating coinage for Jersey.

As there are only three meetings of the Economics and Finance Committee before the end of the year, it is essential that we send sketches to Jersey as soon as possible.

As I should be overseas in the next week or so, can you please address any questions to Mr. Lotherington.

Liberation Anniversary Coins.

Thank you for your letters dated the 24th, 29th, and 31st, October. You raised a number of questions in your letter dated the 24th, October, and my answers are as follows:-

- 1) No, not yet.
- 2) No, not yet.
- 3) I can confirm that Design B will be used on both the £2 and 50 pence coins, but see my comments in "6" below.
- 4) Yes.
- 5) Agreed.
- 6) We believe it essential to have the full inscription "Bailiwick of Jersey" on the coin. It is suggested that the words "Two Pounds" could be on the obverse. I would like to leave the final decision until you have forwarded sketches of the reverse designs.
- 7) These have not yet arrived. Time is now getting short, since the designs must be approved by the Finance and Economics Committee. There are now only three meetings left before the end of the year. We will be having a different Committee next year, because of retirements and elections taking place.
- 8) I have considered opening the subscription list a fortnight earlier (i.e. on the 1st of January), but I feel that interest in coins in the period following Christmas is likely to be low. There is no question of ordering blanks for coins ahead of orders. A period of twelve weeks from order to delivery seems to be excessive and, I am sure you will do your best to reduce this period. As our plans currently stand, you would have nine weeks from the end of the closure of our subscription list to the delivery date. Do you not have a stock of silver crown blanks for UK issue that we could borrow?



Thank you for your letter of the 18th October, 1984 concerning the above coins. I will need to speak with you on the telephone when you return to work next week, but there are some points that I thought worth while setting down in writing for your consideration.

- 1. Do you wish me to purchase the metal for the cupro-nickel version of the crown?
- 2. Do you wish me to purchase the metal for the fifty pence coins?
- 3. I am arranging for a sketch of the common obverse for these two coins to be sent to you. I have assumed that the inscription will be the same as on your present obverse design, and will read "Queen Elizabeth The Second"
- 4. I suggest that the obverse of the fifty pence coin is dated to conform to the present practice on your circulation coins.
- 5. I do not propose to date the obverse of the crown size piece and this will mean that you will not be involved in further tooling or re-dating costs in future years for coins of the same specification provided of course that the same effigy is used.
- 6. I propose that the dates 1945-1985 will appear on the reverse as part of the design together with the word "Jersey" and the denomination "Two Pounds". I do not think that there will be room for the full inscription "Bailiwick of Jersey".
- 7. I will also be forwarding to you early next week



alternatives for the reverse of the crown and fifty pence coins.

- 8. I am concerned over the timing. If coins are required to be delivered in Jersey by the end of April, then we would need to commence production, including gold and silver, four weeks before that. This means that we will need to order sufficient blanks for production of the silver and gold coins at lease eight weeks prior to the commencement of striking the coins. Thus, I will need to order blanks at the end of January at the very latest. This will mean either borrowing or purchasing bullion at that time.
- I am discussing our marketing requirements with my colleagues and will revert to you in the near future.

Please let me know if either you or Ian intend being in London in the near future as it might be useful to have a meeting before the end of November in order to finalise some of these details.

Thank you very much for the information you provided from your sick-bed the other evening. I hope your health is now fully restored.

The Finance and Economics Committee agreed yesterday to authorise the striking of the following coins to commemorate the 40th anniversary of the Liberation of Jersey - May 9th 1985:-

Up to 20,000 £2 Crowns in brilliant uncirculated Cupro-Nickel.

Up to 2,500 in Sterling Silver.

Up to 40 Gold.

At least 50,000 fifty pence coins for general circulation with a suitable obverse design.

It is expected that 15,000 Crowns will be struck initially for sale in the Island. We are to issue 10,500 to school children. The silver and gold versions will be marketed on a subscription basis. Since only 40 Gold coins have been authorised we would need to give first option to Island Residents. The 50,000 fifty pence pieces would be struck at one time.

The Committee were happy with the new effigy and we would agree to Design B for both the Crown and the fifty pence coin.

The obverse of the Crown would be a representative of the SS Vega. We are not entirely happy with the drawings submitted to us and have asked for an 'in-house' design. Ian Monins has supplied comments regarding this design and new material to your artist. Ian has also asked for a "crossed-flags" design to be drawn for the obverse of the fifty pence coin. I return the original sketch of the SS Vega as you requested.






