**Commentary:** This is the **working receipt journal** of the Mint's melting department. "Henry Wm. Atkinson" was the Melter, receiving raw silver bars and issuing receipts. "Jas. Wm. Morrison" signed for the **Company of Moneyers** — the private contractors who actually struck the coins. The Jersey bullion arriving as **Silver Dollars** (Spanish 8-reales) weighed 192 lbs 3oz 10dwt, confirming the figures seen in the monthly accounts. The careful documentation of every parcel reflects the Mint's rigorous accountability for precious metals.
